## Cultural Studies 331: Contemporary Feminist Theories Spring 1997

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### Course description:

This course will examine some of the major preoccupations of contemporary feminist theories, particularly those resulting from postructuralism and postcolonialism. We will discuss sources of conflict and unity between women, theories of difference, sUbjectivity and agency, and the turn toward gender studies. syllabus presupposes some familiarity with the intellectual and historical rOots of contemporary feminist theories. Half the readings for the semester will be determined by students in the course, according to their interests.
